


Rialto Theater Opens Tonight in Hallowell

Dramatic Club Pantomime Today At High School

A pantomime entitled "The Lost Walks" will be presented by Hallowell High School Dramatic Club during the assembly period this evening. Miss Eleanor Bissell, faculty advisor for the club, will direct the program.

The cast is as follows: A real estate agent—a pretty young girl, Eleanor Aldrich; Henrietta, a maid of 16, Charlotte Barrett; Justin, the main, John Woodside; Cleopatra, vamp, Francesca Perrazi; Johnny, an English gentleman, Henry LeClair; the "trucking" butler, Raymond Curtis; four ghosts, Donald Nichols, Robert Fuller, Robert Richards and Betty Potter; the doctor, Charles Gray. The place, an old house, and the time, a stormy night.

A short skit, "Which One Are You?" concerning "study hall" at Hallowell High will conclude the program. Taking part will be Raymond Curtis and Virginia Moore.

Several selections by Mary Vigus and numbers by the school dance orchestra will be interspersed during the assembly period.

The new Rialto Theater, a small but tastefully appointed building remodeled from the former Universalist Church at the corner of Central and Second Streets will open this evening with two showings of "Alexander's Ragtime Band," one of the best pictures of 1933.

Norman J. Beauparlant of Lewiston, manager, said many of the best shows of the past year were scheduled for the near future. There will also be newsreels, comedies and other shorts to fill out daily programs at 6:30 and 8:30 P. M.

The interior of the auditorium is modernistically decorated, with lighting fixtures of modern design placed on circular plaques. The walls are of Nu-Wood and the ceiling of acoustical panel material.

The latest type of sound projecting equipment, with reflector arcs will be used in the projecting room. The building is equipped with a blower system for heating and air circulating which keeps the auditorium supplied with free air continually.

Hallowell Gets Even Decision With Williams

Boys Win Out 33 to 18 While Girls Drop Close One in Last Period 32 to 27

Hallowell, Jan. 11.—The Granite City boys basketball team, behind for two periods, put the pressure on in the last two in their game with Williams High of Oakland here to night and walked away with a final 33 to 18 victory.

The Hallowell girls, fighting desperately, came from behind in the third period to tie the score at 22 all but faded in the final frame and dropped a close and exciting game to the visiting girls 32 to 27. The girls scored 13 points in the first period to but two for Williams, but were unable to keep up the pace in the fourth period and lost out by the slim margin of five points.

The boys' game appeared like an other defeat for the Granite City clan. They trailed 11 to 8 at the end of the first period and 12 to 11 at half time. In the third period the game came to life and took the lead 29 to 16 and were never headed after that.

Thanks to some fine shooting and even finer guarding the boys gave Williams but six points in the last two periods and only two in the final frame.

Nichols and Gray led the score with 26 points between them.

The Williams girls walked out front in the first period 11 to 6 and continued to increase their margin in the second canto 23 to 12. In the third period the Hallowell girls began to ring them and when the period ended they were tied with the visitors 25 to 25. In the last period they were unable to keep up the pace and lost out.
